

ILICA AND THE MEMORIAL CENTRE TO THE 1991/1995 ZAGREB ROCKET ATTACKS

You are on Ilica which, up until very recently, was the longest Street in Zagreb. It connects the City's centre with its western part, is 5,600 metres-long and contains over five hundred addresses. It is one of the oldest streets in the Lower Town, which developed as the City expanded from the elevated Upper Town. Its current incarnation was mostly formed at the end of the 19th Century and the beginning of the 20th Century, when a number of typical buildings and numerous shops sprang up and remain a feature to this day. In the southern turnoff from Ilica, at No. 4 Petrićeva Street, the Memorial Centre to the 1991/1995 Zagreb Rocket Attacks is located. It commemorates those killed and wounded during the attacks on the City centre and Zagreb's civilian population.

This permanent Memorial Centre exhibition presents the attacks made by the Yugoslav People's Army on the City of Zagreb as the political, social, economic and strategic centre of the Republic of Croatia during the war years between 1991 and 1995. The war events which happened during the City of Zagreb recent history can be observed through a series of photographs and documents, video animations of air raids and documentary videos, all accompanied by sound and light effects that bear witness to the pall of war hung over Zagreb and Croatia at this time.

This Memorial Centre is open to visitors on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays between 10 AM and 6 PM. Ticket prices and all other information can be found at: https://www.mgz.hr/hr/zbirke/memorijalni-centar-raketiranja-zagreba-1991_1995,101.html.
